# 1. Significant Organization and Unit Activities

## a. Principle Operations

- (1) From -1 August to 7 August, Bravo Troop supported the 3rd Bde. in operation Kentucky Racer. From 8 August until 22 August, Bravo Troop supported the 1st Squadron 11 ACR. From 23 August until 31 August, Bravo Troop supported the 1st Squadron 11 ACR and the 3rd Bde. 1st ACD.
- (2) Activity in operation Kentucky Racer was moderate. Working with the 11 ACR, activity was heavy.
- (3) Aircraft firings during August were heavy. There were 31 aircraft firings, 6 hits, and 1 aircraft destroyed.
- (4) During the month of August, Bravo Troop performed 10 LaRakara insertions and 8 extractions.
- (5) Sabre Blues were inserted 8 times during the month of August and killed 8 VC. They captured 10 individuals, 60 rds. of AK-47 ammo, 3 60mm mortar rds., 7 B-40 rockets, 3 packs, and numerous medical supplies. They penetrated one base camp and one training area.
- (6) Bravo Troop marked targets for 30 air strikes and performed 28 BDA's of air strikes and 18 heavy artillery BDA's. These air strikes and BDA's accounted for 330 meters of trench line destroyed, 77 structures destroyed, and 350 bunkers des troyed.

### b. Other Activies

- (1) During the month of August, Bravo Troop continued to cocupy the same living area at LZ Andy.

#### . c. Base Defense


- (1) Bravo Troop continued to man 7 bunkers on the green line with 3 men per bunker.
- (2) The troop took over all of the 81mm mortar support for the red sector of the green line.
  - (3) Ammunition revetments were made for 81mm ammo at the troop pit area.
- (4) The pit area was improved by building a berm around it and adding additional sandbags.
- (5) After the engineers put new wire in front of the bunkers, the troop placed trip flares in the wire for early warning.
- (6) The bunkers were improved on the inside by installing shelves and floors.
- (7) A bunker ammunition SOP was started, calling for ammunition to be placed on the newly installed shelves. This gives uniformity to all the bunkers, and it makes for quick access to anything in the bunkers.

### d. Base Development

During the period of 1 August to 31 August, Bravo Troop went ahead with work on already started projects and started a few new ones. Because of new regulations governing the erection of new buildings and acquisition of materials with which to complete already started projects, completion of many of the projects has not been achieved.

- (1) The building of the new revetments on Scabbard Flight Line by the Corps of Engineers has not yet been completed.
- (2) Both Blue Lift and Scout Platoon sections have built small structures for additional storage space.
- (3) The motor pool was moved from Scabbard Flight Line to the area just above the Bravo Troop T.O.C.
- (4) The mess hall finished repairing and remodeling one wing of the ALS dining area. Further work to the mess hall has yet to be done by P.A. ATTER drainage ditch which was to circumnavigate the mess hall was Klarted but yours finished.
